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


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
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BYU sometimes feels like a couple's culture. The constant focus on dating can be overwhelming for single students.

DINNER DATES

any guys don't realize that deciding what to order when you're at a restaurant together for the first time can present a dilemma for your date. From trying to send the right impression to avoiding something that will get stuck in her teeth, there are considerations that run through a woman's mind before she orders.

Women don't want to order something that costs more than you want to pay. Often they will pick a less expensive item on the menu if they don't know what your price range is. Give your date a cue to help her know what you're thinking is an appropriate choice.

"I think the fajitas or the chicken wrap sound good. What are you hungry for?" This simple line will let her reference what those choices cost and then choose her own meal at a similar price.

WHERE TO EAT

If you haven't decided on a restaurant yet, ask your date where they want to go. If you're the one being asked, speak up if you're craving something or have a favorite restaurant (if it's appropriate, i.e. don't suggest higherend restaurants like Tucanos).

"The tacos at Las Brassas are the best but I'm also in the mood for a calzone at Nicolitalia. Do either of those places sound good to you?" If your date doesn't feel comfortable suggesting a restaurant, this cue takes some of the pressure off him or her and still gives them input in the decision.

AVOID

- · Long-noodled pasta if you aren't confident in vour twirl.
- · Corn on the cob, spinach, popcorn and other foods that will take up residence between your teeth.
- · Anything that will leave you with bad breath (cheese, onions, garlic, tuna, etc.)
- Food that requires manual labor (like crab legs, lobster, etc.) that you haven't done before.

TWO SENSE

NOT JUST HEARING, FEELING HEARD

ave you ever felt like your date has stopped opening up to you or that the conversation is lagging? The solution may not be in having better topics but in listening better to your date. Listening well will help your date trust you faster, feel valued and appreciate your company. According to H. John Pace, a professional mediator and manager for the Center for Conflict Resolution at BYU, the key to listening properly is to listen for understand-

"There are really two kinds of listening," Pace said, "listening to understand and listening to respond. When you only listen to respond, you're looking for opportunities to win a debate, you don't really care about what the other person has to say."

Good listening is a skill that can be practiced and acquired. You do not, how-



ever, need to master every listening skill before your efforts will be recognized.

"Some people just don't have a silver tongue," Pace said. "Luckily, research shows that it's not about having the right words, but the meaning is in the heart of the person. What is most appreciated is that you are actually trying to understand."

While your attitude is the most important thing to get right, practice these skills from John H. Pace to become a truly expert listener:

Acknowledge Feelings

We do not need to agree with what the other person is saying, but we should always acknowledge their feelings are real. Acknowledgment should come before any attempts at problem solving or correcting.

Verbal Cues

You can see and hear when someone is listening to you. Occasional verbal cues, like OK or mhmm, signal to your date that you are still listening.

Asking follow-up questions shows you want to hear what your date has to say. Make an effort to ask openended questions and inquire about things you don't fully understand.

Paraphrase

Paraphrase or summarize what your date said after they finish talking. This allows you to make sure you correctly understood what your date said and show you heard them. Comment on the last thing your date said to show you listened all the way through.

Body Language

Facial expressions, body language and tone can communicate more than words themselves. Occasionally nod your head and face the person who is talking to you.

Value What They Are Saying

Having all the skills does not make as much difference as actually valuing what the other person has to say.

RETURNED MISSIONARIES

The RM Stereotype

People think returned missionaries can only talk about their missions. According to a campus survey, the majority of people do not mind when RMs talk about their missions on a date.

"Personally, I'm looking for someone who didn't just 'go' on a mission," said Megan Cooley, a Recreation Therapy major from Layton. "I want to

know that it changed them and that they'll continue to be a better person because of it."

While many in the survey expressed interest in knowing what kind of missionary their date was, there was a strong repulse toward "mission-focused"

Caroline Madsen, a music education major, emphasized this point. "When guys talk about their missions it shows

that they care, but if that's all they talk about, that's not good,' Madsen said. Johanna

Taylor, a preanimation major agrees with Madsen.

"My quota is two mission stories per date — any more than that and I tune out," Taylor said. "The purpose of a date is to get to know the other

Andrew Fike, an accounting major from Toomball, Texas, gave his opinion about dating a returned missionary.

"If they mention it in a positive way that's a

pretty good indicator of their spirituality," Fike said. However, if it feels like a girl is prideful about having served a mission he said it would rub him the wrong way.

Daniel Anderson, a senior from Fruit Heights, also gave his opinion. "I served a mission too, so it's relatable," Anderson said. "But if they just keep talking about their mission it seems like they can't find something else that's relatable.

So talk about your mission. Tell a story, make your date laugh, but be careful telling serious stories or spending a whole date talking about your mission.

Meeting People

Brent L. Top, a former mission president and the current Dean of Religious Education at BYU, gave missionaries some tips about how to transition from missionary life into dating.

"In reality, the skills we use as missionaries are the exact same," Top said. "You are going to use those same abilities to talk to people, make people feel comfortable, and be a friend."

Making Marriage a Priority

7 "Missionaries have taught about the plan of salvation and eternal families for $1\frac{1}{2}$ to 2years" Top said. "We better step up to the plate and say 'that's what I want in my own life."

THE EVOLUTION OF DATING COMMUNICATION



1940s

Letters of romance were common for lovebirds in the olden days. World War I and World War II meant that a lot of women had a man they were writing in the military.

1960s

From the time of landlines until cell phones, it wasn't unusual to look up a cute girl's number in the BYU directory and call her up. If the cold call worked, eventually they were talking on the phone for hours.

1990s

Pagers shook up the dating scene in the '90s. After a date couples would send codes to each other such as 143, which meant "I love you," or 56, which meant "sweet dreams."

2000s

Cell phones revolutionized the way we date. "Our kids will never know what it's like to call their crush's home phone and be scared that the parents will pick up," said Rachel Gillie, a 2004 BYU graduate.

2010s

Today many people use social media and texting in dating. If a boy or girl meets someone they are attracted to, they look that person up on Facebook to see if they have common interests.

"A lot of times a guy will date a girl because he thinks she's fun to pass the time while he's keeping his eyes open for the girl of his dreams," said Elijah Hess, a junior studying construction management.

The best thing you can do to avoid getting played is to keep your emotions in check at the beginning of any relationship and to try to look at everything objectively. If something doesn't feel right, it probably isn't. Save yourself the heartache and end the game before he wins.

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SAYING GOODNIGHT

The date is ending, you're at the doorstep and it's time to say goodnight. What do you do? The majority of BYU guys interviewed for this article agree that a hug is the way to go.

"If a girl isn't interested in a guy, she needs to be honest," said Dane Christiansen, a junior studying business strategy. "She needs to communicate it to the guy early and save him time and his feelings—we'll respect you for it."

Saying "no" to a guy or girl who is interested in you is hard because you don't want to hurt the other person. However, if you truly do not see anything happening between the two of you, let them know and don't hide behind excuses.

"Just be straight up with them," said Melissa Law, a freshman studying nursing. "But if you think there might be a possibility, go on the date to find out"

veral years ago I remember seeing a friend's relationship status on Facebook change from In a relationship to Single. It came as a surprise. As far as I knew she was happy in her relationship and showed no sign of wanting out. More importantly, she was my girlfriend. I quickly sent a text, followed by a phone call, and sure enough things were over before we hung up. While breaking up is not the fairy tale ending we might hope for, sometimes it is right and necessary.

"I always tell my students that it's OK to break up with good, decent people," said Brian Willoughby, assistant professor in the School of Family Life. "People struggle with break ups because we feel like we have to await for some big issue to arrive."

Breaking up with someone can be intimidating, but we all deserve more than a status update or text to let us know it is happening. Here are some tips from students and professionals to help it happen properly.

DON'T PROCRASTINATE

"People struggle with breakups because we feel like we have to wait for some big issue to arise," Willoughby said. "So we get stuck in these relationships where we are like. 'I'm pretty sure I want to end this, I'm pretty sure I don't want to marry you, but I kind of have to wait until we have that big fight, and I have an excuse.' We end up in these relationships for weeks or months longer than we sh

While it takes courage to initiate a breakup, putting it off will delay future opportunities and can create unnecessary

BE KIND AND CONSIDERATE

You should not treat unkindly someone who has invested so much time and effort into you. It's not good for your reputation, and most importantly, knowing we are all children of God we should respect each other.

"Give little hints that it is coming so they are not completely blindsided," said Alyssa Smith, a freshman from Gainesville, Va. "That's the worst."

"Once the decision has been made, stick to it," said Knight. "I don't know that I would recommend rehearsing it, but think it through and don't let them talk you out

It is hard to know what you're going to say is going to hurt someone, especially someone you care about. Because of this, people try to soften the blow by dancing around the issue. 
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HOW TO SET YOUR FRIENDS UP


"People can see stuff about us that we



It takes self-control to avoid serious dating before a mission. However, focusing on creating strong relationships offers the most happiness in the long run. Hill also encouraged pre-missionaries to avoid romance before their missions. It is much easier to continue a strong friendship you developed before your mission, rather than one built on physical intimacy.

If you are not planning on serving a mission, begin practicing principles of mature dating. Work on becoming more comfortable with members of the opposite sex in one-on-one situations. Learn to ask questions, focus on others and be yourself.

Hill said



If you decide to take the leap, here are a few important tips to consider.

First, relax. It's natural to be nervous, but do your best to be yourself. Remember the person you are dating is probably nervous too, so do your best to make them feel comfortable.

Second, get to know your date. Learn the art of good conversation: asking questions and being genuinely interested in the other person's responses. The more you focus on other people the more you can relax

en and women rarely feel ready to move forward in a relationship at the same time. When you're feeling ready to move into an exclusive relationship, how can you tell if he/she is on the same page?

NOTICE THEIR ACTIONS

Do they seem happy to be around you? Do they stand close to you? Do they talk about activities you could do in the future together? These are all signals they enjoy having you around. Do they laugh at your jokes? Offer you compliments? Walk across the room to talk to you? Take heart, at the very least they think your worth their while.

PAY ATTENTION TO COMMUNICATION

According to Brian Willoughby, a professor of family life, if someone is opening up and sharing their feelings with you, it is a good sign they feel comfortable around you.

Conversation should flow and feel natural. However, if you are the only one opening up, they might not feel as comfortable in the relationship as you do.

"If I'm in a dating relationship, where we've gone on a couple of dates and we're starting to have that sharing back and forth," Willoughby said. "I see that person starting to share their emotions and feelings about life. That can be a good indicator that person is getting more connected and more invested in the relationship."

LOOK FOR GIVE AND TAKE

"I always judged if someone was interested by whether or not they wanted to keep in contact during the week," said Fred Nelson, a senior majoring in public health.

If they are sending occasional texts or making contact throughout the week,

they are usually interested in keeping the relationship going. Keep in mind you shouldn't initiate all of the contact. Make sure that if you are interested you're not just waiting around either. However, if you're love interest doesn't reciprocate, don't fret.

Occasionally people will be shy or overwhelmed with school, and hesitate to reach out. Think about their responses, If they seem happy you reached out, don't give up yet just because you are doing most of the work for now.


DON'T PUSH TOO HARD

There is no set timeline for when a serious relationship should develop. Depending on a person's background, they may move faster or slower into commitment. Take things one date at a time. Questions answered about communicating through the first date

hink back to the last date you went on with someone new. Chances are you spent at least a little time worrying about what to say or not to say, hoping not to make a fool of yourself. Despite hearing stories of poor first encounters ending happily ever after, we still fret about making a good first impression.

When isn't it appropriate to send a text? How do I ask someone on a date? Should I wait before making contact after the first date? When should you send a post-date text? There aren't very many set rules when it comes to dating communication; however, following these guides will help you play it safe.

HOW DO I MAKE THE INTRODUCTION?

Introductions are simpler than we make them. Despite our worries that we will seem unimaginative or boring, asking basic questions about someone is a great way to start a conversation. Look for interesting aspects of a person's background and inquire further to keep the discussion flowing.

Brynne Turville, a junior from Holladay, said meeting new people on campus really comes down to being open to starting up conversations. Often, our situation will make the introduction for us.

"Sometimes people would come sit down by me in the library and sometimes I would choose to sit by other people," Turville said. "If they were really studying hard I wouldn't bother them, but otherwise I would just ask what they were studying, where they were from and we would talk. I was actually asked to lunch several times."

Starting up a conversation can be as simple as asking a classmate what they thought of last night's assignment, or a asking fellow ward member if they enjoyed Sunday School. But even total strangers on their way to class or sitting around campus will very rarely be bothered by a friendly introduction.

Honestly, I don't think there is a situation on campus that I would be offended if someone approached me as long they didn't try to talk for too long.

HOW DO I ASK?

Simple is best when it comes to asking someone on a date. Ask in person or over the phone and make it obvious you intend to take them on a date, not just hang out. Otherwise you may end up meeting both them and their friend for lunch. Texting is not an appropriate way to ask someone on a date.

"If you are not asking in person, you should definitely use the phone," said Emily-Jane Proudfoot, a freshman from Colchester, England. "I like at least to hear a voice. From text it's hard to communicate whether they are excited or not, and they don't really know how you're feeling."

Asking if you can take someone out to lunch makes for a simple, convenient and comfortable first date. It also leaves little to question about whether or not tag-a-longs are invited.

WHAT SHOULD I COMMUNICATE BEFORE THE DATE?

Do everything you can to make sure your date does not come ill prepared.

"You should really communicate, if you're asking someone on a date, where you're going, what day and time, if you're paying and how she should dress and prepare for it," said Eric Smith, a senior from Chicago.

Give your date enough notice so they can prepare ahead of time. Waiting until the last second to inform your date of an awesome hike you have planned may not be adequate notice for them to change into sneakers.

"I like to plan, so I like to have everything in my head figured out," Proudfoot said. "I have had guys not tell me what we're doing until the time and that's not easy."

There is no need, however, to assume you need to tell your date everything in your head and heart. Some things should go without saying, according to Smith.

"What you shouldn't need to communicate to your date is whether or not you're interested in them.... What's the point of asking someone on a date if you're not somewhat interested in them as a person?" Smith said. "If a girl is being asked on a date, she should be able to expect that the guy has some sort of interest in her."



SHOULD WE TEXT?

Texting before and between dates can be a great tool for solidifying plans, but keeping texting light before the date can help dialogue on the date feel more natural.

"I like texting for going over details or confirming things, but I am not a fan of having conversations over texting," said Dallas Hileman, a sophomore from Bountiful. "Unless I know them well in person already, I can't stand it. If you text too much, then when you meet up in person it makes conversation awkward."

Choosing to call, visit in person, or deliver a note instead of texting can add a great personal touch, said Stafford Newsome, a sophomore from Nashville.

"I think texting is important to keep conversation open," Newsome said, "but I think texting can be a hindrance in a way. There are so many old fashioned ways that have more appeal and can show that you mean something a lot more."

WHAT DO WE TALK ABOUT ON THE DATE?

The entire goal of a date should be to learn about the other person. Follow up on things you learned about your date previously and fill in the gaps in their background.

"Really get to know the person on the date," Smith said. "Find out where they're from, what they like or don't like, gain insights beyond just basic talk and have fun with it."

Keep conversation from becoming too one sided. Dialogue should involve both parties talking. This is easiest to achieve by looking for similar interests or shared experiences.

"The only reason I've ever felt uncomfortable (on a date) is if the guy isn't talking, and I'm having to make the conversation," Proudfoot said. "That's OK in some situations, but if he's just sitting there while I'm talking, that's not good. If he's just talking at me and I'm only passively responding, that's probably not good either." As the date is winding down, be sure to thank your date for their time. If you are interested in seeing the person again, this can also be a good time to let them know.

"You can make it clear if you are expecting to ask a girl on a second date," Smith said.

"If you hint, they can let you know if they're interested in a second date as well."

WHAT ABOUT POST-DATE TEXTS?

A common form of stress after the first date is caused by post-date texts. Unfortunately, despite their popularity and perceived importance, very few people agree upon their meaning.

"On almost all dates I will send a postdate text," Sierra Baker said. "The guy took you out, and even if it didn't cost any money, he took time out of his schedule. So in almost all cases I think you should send a quick text saying 'thank you.' If it's a guy that I might be interested in, I try to make the text a little more embellished."

Like Baker, some girls will always send a post-date text as a way of saying "thank you" for your time, not intending to imply any sort of interest or lack of. Other girls have more complex systems for letting a guy know her feelings through the text.

In the end, the safest advice for post-date texts is to stress less and not place importance on it. Take any texts at face value and try not to read into it any more. If you had a fun time and expect they might have as well, ask them out again.

after," Proudfoot said. "You might wait two or three days, but make casual conversation over the next week just seeing how their day is going or something."

Try not to overwhelm them by sending constant messages or stopping them every time you see them. An occasional message or two should suffice unless they seem interested in picking up a conversation.

When you feel comfortable asking them on another date, take the same approach as the first date. Ask in person or over the phone and keep it straight forward and simple.

"If you want to ask me out again, go for it," Proudfoot said. "I don't like games or sneaking around. Confidence is more attractive."

I kind of wish all the speculation around postdate texts wasn't a social norm. Occasionally you don't get anything and you're left wondering 'maybe she just isn't in on post-date texts,' but you just don't know. It just complicates things.

hile relationship fundamentals may not have changed much since our parents' day, the way we get to know one another and communicate has shifted. Technology is tightly woven into our lives, from texting to tweeting to Tindering. We make so much information about ourselves available online that some of the mystery is eliminated as soon as someone checks our Facebook page. When the ability to "connect" with someone is just a click away, it can be difficult to know when we've made a real connection.

One of the hardest distinctions to make when using social media is to decide when to share something and when to keep it to yourself.

"I think (social media) makes people's relationships more public," said Sinclaire Hancock, a freshman who is undecided about her major. "It can be cute to post certain things but it can definitely be overused."

With the rise of personal sharing online, potential suitors can find out more about you from your profiles in a matter of minutes than they might learn in person on a first date.

"I think Facebook can be a good dating tool," said Taylor Ottensen, a senior study-

ing neuroscience. "It lets you Facebook stalk someone."


While it may be commonplace to research someone's social media profiles before you ask them out, remember who they are online may not be consistent with who they are in reality.


If you're on the fence about posting something, consult the following guide before you send your feelings off to the Internet.

oes that scenario sound familiar? And what do you think, is it a date? Men and women have different opinions on the subject.

Jordan Beal, a political science major from Layton, said calling something a date brings an element of seriousness to the event.

"Using the word 'date' makes it feel like it's more than just two friends," Beal said.

Guys may be intimidated, not by the date, but by what a girl might be thinking when she is asked out on the date. They think the clearer they are, the more serious the date.

On the other hand, girls become frustrated when guys are unclear about labeling activities as dates.

Coco Mack, a film major, expressed frustration about unclear dating. "I hate fake dates," Mack said. "Sometimes I get asked to hang out, and then all of a sudden we're alone and he's buying me dinner!"

According to Jeffrey Hill, a School of Family Life professor, the dating culture has made it hard to be straightforward when asking someone on a date. "We've gotten away from the dating culture," Hill said. "We're more of a hangout culture so it's awkward."

While men have the mentality, "the clearer we make it the more serious they take it," women want dates to be clear so they know what to wear, what to bring and what to expect. So how can we balance the two?

JUST A 'DATE'

Because hanging out has become the norm, dating is viewed as an elevated, serious activity.

In a May 2005 CES fireside, Elder Dallin H. Oaks said, "If we are to persuade young men to ask for dates more frequently, we must establish a mutual expectation that to go on a date is not to imply a continuing commitment." Essentially, Elder Oaks is saying: Don't take one date too seriously.

If a date simply means "I want to get to know you" instead of "I'm really into you," it will help guys to ask more girls on dates. Students can do their part by asking more people to go on dates, by recognizing that one date simply means one date and by seeking to develop friendships through dating.

'DATE' IN OTHER WORDS

When you ask or are being asked on a date,

there are a few keys things that should be a part of the conversation:

First, it should be clear that you are going together. "Do you want to go to bowling together?" constitutes a date. However, "Hey do you want to go bowling with me and my friends?" is clearly not a date. And if it is, the person asking needs to be clearer.

Second, there should be a mutual understanding about who is buying. Food is a classic example. "Can I buy you lunch?" or "Do you want to get dinner Friday?" imply that the asker is buying and are both clearly dates.


Third, consider who will be on the date. If you are alone doing an activity where you can get to know each other, it is a date. If someone asks you out and you're not sure who is going, feel free to ask who will be there.

Today, it may not be necessary to use the word "date" when asking someone out, but it is important to be clear and give the right cues when you do extend the invitation. Regardless of whether you consider it a date, see the event as an opportunity to have fun, get to know another person and expand your circle of friends.



Ice Cream Sandwiches **COOKIE** 21/4 cups flour

1 teaspoon baking soda

1 teaspoon salt

1 cup (2 sticks) butter, softened

¾ cup sugar

34 cup brown sugar

1 teaspoon vanilla

2 large eggs

2 cups milk chocolate chips

- 1. Preheat oven to 375 degrees Fahrenheit.
- 2. Sift flour, baking soda and salt in small bowl. Beat butter, sugar, brown sugar and vanilla in large bowl until creamy. Add eggs individually, beating well after each addition. Add flour mixture gradually. Stir in chocolate chips with a wooden spoon. Drop by rounded tablespoon onto ungreased baking sheets.
- 3. Bake for ten minutes, or until slightly browned. You don't want the cookies to be too crisp otherwise they will crumble when you make the sandwiches.
- 4. Cool cookies on a rack.
- 5. Once cookies are cool, place them in a plastic bag and refrigerate an hour or so before you want to assemble sandwiches.

FILLING

1 gallon vanilla ice cream 1 bag miniature chocolate chips

- 1. Take ice cream out of freezer five to ten minutes before you want to create the sandwiches so it can unthaw a little.
- 2. Once ice cream is malleable, remove frozen cookies from freezer and lay out two rows of ten cookies that are paired to be similar in size.
- 3. Scoop ice cream onto one cookie then lightly press the top cookie into the ice cream.
- 4. If you want to add extra chocolate, clean a section of your counter and then pour the bag of miniature chocolate chips on it and space them out.
- 5. Roll the sandwich on its side into the chips and add extras with your hands if they don't stick.
- 6. If you want the sandwiches to be less messy when you serve them, stick them in the freezer until it's time



sometimes feels like a couples culture. The engagement rings, handholding couples who block sidewalks and posters for relationship seminars are seemingly everywhere. The constant focus on dating can be overwhelming, especially for single students.

"There is a persistent pressure to become couples because of the value we place on marriage," said Steve Duncan, a professor in the School of Family Life. "At this campus, probably more than any campus in the world, there's an emphasis on getting married."

"The important thing is to de-stress about this perception that everyone is getting married, because if you feed into that perception there's going to be more tension and more discomfort," Duncan said.

If you are single at BYU, you're not alone. According to university spokesman Todd Hollingshead, 49 percent of BYU graduates leave Provo unmarried. While many people want to leave BYU with a degree and a spouse, don't let that desire consume you and keep you from

having meaningful experiences right now.

"Dating isn't everything," said Cameron Kimbal, a sophomore studying accounting. "You don't have to have someone in your life to be happy; go do things you enjoy."

You can be happy when you're not in a relationship. Singlehood is a necessary stage of life when you get to decide who you are and make meaningful relationships and experiences.

"You always hear that you should learn who you are and learn to be happy with yourself before you get in a relationship and that's true because when you're with someone else you want to take care of their needs and may not have time for your own," said Victoria Whitaker, a senior studying human development.

While being single is a necessary stage of life, it isn't always an easy or enjoyable one. If you are struggling, that is completely OK and there are thousands of other people at BYU who share similar

Service doesn't have to mean Y-Serve, though that is an option. Much good can be done simply by listening to what is happening in the lives of people around you and acting how the Savior would. You don't need a t-shirt or an organization to do service; you just need the desire to serve and if you express that to Heavenly Father, He will show



you countless ways to help and love His children.

In addition to doing service, seek out people who lift you up and inspire you to be a better person. This can be friends and family, whose warmth and love will remind you of your worth.

improve now will help you be a better spouse when that time comes.

Just because you aren't with someone right now does not mean you are going to be alone forever. Don't let your single status define you or make you doubt your worth. The best thing you can do with your time is to work on improving yourself and enjoying your life for where and who you are.

IF YOU'VE GIVEN UP

Whether it's been weeks, months or years of being single, you may come to the conclusion that you will never find a significant other. While you may believe having this mentality will protect you from disappointment, you are closing yourself off from experiences and people that could prove to be blessings.

"You don't know that you won't get married," said Lauren Johnson, a senior studying math education. "You might not, but nobody knows the future."

When things look down and you don't know where your life is going, your faith is tested. You can give up and turn away from Heavenly Father, or you can follow the counsel of President Hinckley and keep going.

"Those who move forward with a happy spirit will find that things always work out," he said.

Remember, you don't have an expiration date. Love is not something that can be forced to fit into a certain time frame. When it comes, it will be at the right time and with the right person.

In a culture where dating is the standard, not the exception, being single can be difficult. But even though there are trying days, never let your relationship status keep you from becoming the person you want to be and living the life you were meant to live.

"Enjoy the journey, enjoy the process of getting to know fellow sons and daughters of God," Duncan said. "Let commitments come naturally and not by social norms, whether perceived or not."

If you're not sure, spend time doing things to discover who you are. Do things alone and in groups that will help you know what makes you happy. Explore new things and develop talents you already have.

Josh Weed, a licensed marriage and family therapist, said knowing ourselves will help us recognize when we find the right person. "We can definitely fine tune ourselves, our own spirituality and our own sense of self so that when we do encounter that person that feels right... we're able to recognize it for what it is."

As you find activities and interests that make you happy, stick with them. Become confident and comfortable with your interests. There is no need to make excuses for

Aimee Heffernan Marriage and family therapist what makes you happy, even if others disagree. Remember that you are the most important person that validates you.

Aimee Heffernan, a licensed marriage and family therapist, emphasized this point. "If you fake it and put on a façade, you're doing yourself no favors at all because then you are married and you realize, this person doesn't love the true me," she said. "It's a really painful place to be. You have to show up 100 percent yourself, imperfections and all."

As you date and prepare for marriage you want someone to love you for who you are, not for being someone else. Continuing to accept and develop yourself will increase your confidence. Subsequently, one of the most attractive traits that men find in women is confidence.

Men at BYU Speak Up

In interviews with more than 20 men on BYU's campus, we asked students what trait they found most attractive in a woman. Answers varied from witty, to spontaneous, to intelligent.

We also asked the follow-up question, "Between the trait you said, physical attraction, and self confidence, which trait makes a woman most attractive?"

Guys answers were intriguing because of their unanimity regardless of the guy's taste in women.

Alex Boss, a junior studying advertising, said it is really attractive when a girl is comfortable and confident in herself.

"It's about who she is that's going to keep you there," Boss said, "not what she looks like. The physical attraction will go away, but who she is will stay."

Like most men were willing to admit, Boss added that physical beauty is also an important factor. "Physical attraction is what you look at first, but it's not what's going to hold you."

A sophomore studying animation, Sean Tay said confidence adds to a woman's beauty. "You can be beautiful and not believe in yourself, but if you're confident, everything else seems to fit in."

Spencer Giles, a junior studying business, said, "I think the biggest thing I look for in a girl is someone who is an individual and doesn't need to be influenced by other things of the world." When a girl changes who she is according to the people around her, it's a turn off, Giles said.

Men don't like when women change who they are to please others, even if that person is the man she is with. Being true to yourself is a key to developing your self-confidence.

President Thomas S. Monson described how an honest person thinks and acts. When

a difficult decision must be made, (she) never asks (herself), 'What will others think of me?' but rather. 'What will I think of myself?'"

A confident woman acts with integrity and is honest with herself and others.

"The most attractive thing is when you can talk to someone and they are always real. They can just be who they are," Giles said.

Being honest at all times may be difficult, but it is part of true confidence. Seek to date people who value you for your integrity.

As you act with integrity you will uplift those around you.

Taylor Campbell, an English major from Mission Viejo, California, said that a girl who is self-confident and uplifts others stands out to guys.

"Here at BYU there is a huge pick of attractive girls, and someone who is positive and makes you feel good is more attractive. Even if that person isn't as attractive and has a positive attitude, I am much more likely to hang out with that girl than a girl who is beautiful but negative," Campbell said.

Confidence enhances a woman's beauty. And the most important, enduring confidence comes from knowing she is a child of God.

True Self-Confidence

A woman who is confident in herself knows she is a daughter of God. When asked where self-confidence comes from, Sean Tay referred to the Young Women values.

"Divine nature and (individual) worth," Tay said. "If you know who you are, it doesn't matter what the world tells you. If they say you are hideous or beautiful, you know who you are."

A woman who does not know who she is will struggle when she is left without worldly validation, Tay said. "When it is just you, looking at yourself in the mirror, do you still think you're beautiful?"

A confident woman does not measure her self-worth on the backdrop of worldly values. Instead, her confidence stems from remembering her destiny and identity as a daughter of her Heavenly Father.

Men can tell the difference between a woman who bases her confidence off of worldly values and a woman who's confidence comes from the knowledge that she is a daughter of God. The latter is what men interviewed said was most attractive.

Strengthening Your Confidence

The Lord declared, "Whosoever will lose his life for my sake shall find it" (Matthew 16:25). This doctrine is key to building your confidence.

Christ taught all to focus on others in

order to find themselves. Thinking outward is a principle that should be applied in every facet of living.

Giles applied this principle to conversations with others. "Talk to people — and listen to them! I think as you get to know other people, you know yourself better," he said.


Jeffrey Hill, a School of Family Life professor, also addressed where true self-confidence comes from. "On a fundamental level (confidence) is becoming a disciple of Jesus Christ," Hill said. "When you know who you are and you are confident in that, then you can be confident in all your relationships."


If you are someone struggling with selfconfidence, seek to become a true disciple of Jesus Christ by aligning your will with God. Pray, read your scriptures, attend church and worship in the temple.

Making these habits meaningful will help you accept the Lord's timing. While they are not a checklist to getting more dates, these activities will help you be patient and faithful as you wait upon the Lord.

As you do so, the promises of the Lord will sustain you in all that you do. You will be supported by an enduring confidence that stems from the spiritual witness that you are a child of God.

This confidence, true confidence, is what makes women most attractive.

"After spending so much time together while dating, we both knew exactly what we were getting into," Emily said. "After marrying Taylor, I definitely couldn't see myself with anyone but him."

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
